




Get - Go Day



The graduation was emotional because the academy won all of the awards except for the 2.4km run, sit ups and push ups.



Waka Ama

This year we were thrilled to have strong junior interest in Waka Ama, with two J16 girls teams, a J16 boys team, and a J19 girls team representing our kura. Training three times a week in Ōtaki, our paddlers had just four weeks to prepare for regionals, and another two for nationals - every minute on the water counted as they worked to refine technique, build strength, and master timing.

The 2025 Secondary Schools Waka Ama Nationals took place at Tikitapu (Blue Lake) in Rotorua, drawing over 2,200 paddlers from 124 schools - the largest competition to date. Our teams competed in W12 250m double-hull sprints and W6 250m and 500m races. For many of our students, it was their first time competing at this level - and they rose to the challenge! Finishing times and placings in the heats determined progression, making every race count.

We were proud to see both J16 girls teams qualify for Te Ihu, the top division for the 250m races. Our J19 girls made it into Te Tākere, while the J16 boys pushed through to Te Kei. A massive shoutout to our J16 boys, who placed 2nd in their semi and went on to finish a brilliant 4th in the final!

The 500m turn races brought another level of intensity. Our J16 girls Kurahaupō Kōhine team won their heat and progressed to the Te Ihu semifinals. Both our J16 girls and boys teams placed 4th, moving into Te Tākere, and the J19 girls secured a place in Te Kei. While no teams made it through to the finals in the 500m, our Punahau Panthers J16 girls team delivered a gutsy semifinal race, finishing 2nd - just missing the finals by split seconds.
